Postcard from Berta Smetana, Jewish Austrian victim of the Shoah, deported to Auschwitz in 1942 with her 11 year old daughter, Sonja. Postcard sent to Berta's daughter, Lucie, and read by her great granddaughter, Faith Eliora Bayode aged 10.

Letter from Amalia Kohout about her son Josef Kohout, imprisoned for his homosexuality at Sachsenhausen concentration camp in 1939. Read by Ambassador Daniel B. Baer, U.S. Representative to the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE). Reading of German text (tbc).

Letter from Moritz Frostig, Jewish Austrian victim of the Shoah, deported to Jungfernhof Concentration Camp in Riga in 1941, and shot by the Einsatzgruppen in the Bikernieki Forest. Reading by his great grandson, Kabren Frostig Levinson.

Chief Rabbi Chaim Eisenberg, Benediction.
